From the Area C Director....

July and August are now behind us – they passed so quickly. I was out of town for a few weeks with the family and came back to green grass and a "moderate" fire danger level, so I guess the rain showed up often enough to keep everyone safe.

Another Sunshine Music Festival has just wrapped up and I'd like to thank all of the volunteers that showed up for this great South of Town event. Without the support of the community this event, and many others around town, wouldn't happen. The Sunshine Music Festival is a zero-waste event that came off without a hitch, partially due to the portable dishwasher that the Regional District, through Let's Talk Trash, has available for use. It's good to see the RD and the community doing what it can to reduce waste.

Even though the schools were off session, the RD was still hard at work. Some of the things that happened were the construction of four new bus stops (two South of town) and a new camping cabin at Haywire Bay Campground. The bus stops were 80% funded by BC Transit, so I'd like to commend the RD staff in tracking down money from outside sources to improve our community. The board also voted to apply for a grant to continue the Wood Stove Exchange program into 2020 and to support the resolutions going to the Union of BC Municipalities requesting the province restore funding support for libraries. Since 2009 provincial funding for the library system has remained stagnant – we would like to see it increased to reflect inflation and the value that the province places on our libraries.

Another thing that was passed by the board was the establishment of a statutory reserve fund to be used as a repository for money going towards parkland acquisition. This has been on the minds of a lot of Area C residents for a long time – it's nice to get the ball finally rolling. This is a small step, but it's a step, and the staff has been directed to write a report on options for building the fund and to look for grants to access. More news will follow as it comes available.

That's about it for now. School is back in session so keep an eye out for students and buses on the roads. If the stop sign is out on the bus, please pay attention to it.
